1. Welcome from Chair & Review of 2024

Rob Moores welcomed the 30 people attending the AGM, thanked Sarah-Jane, Sonja and Rosie for their work putting the Celebration event together, and members of the Committee for their involvement over the past year.

He shared a compilation video showcasing the **2024 #GetGrowingLeeds campaign** featuring comments and images from the groups involved and the local growers who produced plants for the campaign.

The Committee then gave updates on a couple of projects which has been developed over 2024:

Sarah-Jane gave an update on the **Farm Groups Legume project** (in Rosie and Sonjas absence); Along with partners from the University of Leeds They have secured funding to promote Legumes in the region educating and informing on what to grow and how to use the fresh and dried pulses as a protein rich food source in our diets.

We discussed how the **Little Veg Library** (LVL) campaign had been adopted by Incredible Edible Leeds and many groups had created one at their site. We have a total of 21 sites listed on the map.

The committee are also working with a range of green providers across the city to explore a **capacity building project** – the idea is to have a funded role to support the voluntary organisations across the city. This role would not be aligned to any single organisation but

support all groups. The role could be used to promote events and organise a timetable of engagement activities (such as workshops, social events) to bring people growing across the city together.

Rob and Penny confirmed they are working with the council to develop Edible Growing in Parks.

Rob also confirmed that the REAP edible bed at Oakwood is to be handed over to a newly formed LS8 -based Incredible Edibles group working around the edible bed at Oakwood Clock. If you are interested in being involved please contact Rob at passion4plants@hotmail.com

Penny Pinn is super, super passionate about gardening, growing and especially composting. She deserves recognition for the millions of hours she gives to these projects, her local community and the city wide.





6. Updates from attendees

Fruit Works Co-operative- Alan and Gini have been busy planting, pruning and selling fruit trees all winter.

- Our city passed the milestone of 100 community orchards, which was featured on the Radio 4 Today programme: https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/m0028983 (26 minutes in).
- We've got a busy programme of activities and training for the rest of the year: https://www.fruitworks.org.uk/courses.
- We are actively looking for community groups who want to increase fruit growth and tree cover in private gardens by distributing bulk quantities.

Yorkshire Mushroom Emporium (YME) – Ed Elcock & Niall Johnston

Ed confirmed that the YME have 2 salaried staff, and they will be working for the next 12 months to develop their business model and show that it can be successful and make money. Diversification into workshops and other opportunities are being explored to increase their portfolio.

Plate2Plate Compost - Mark Warner https://www.plate2platecompost.com/

Mark confirmed that the business has relocated to a new location at Swillington Farm and Mark is working full time now. He has the support of Hayden, and together they collect waste from business' and homes to create local compost which they sell as a product.

Meanwood Valley Urban Farm – Adam Ogilvie https://www.mvuf.org.uk/

Adam confirmed the market garden developed by Ben and Luke has been handed over to Jenn, Lou and Angharad. They are now leading the project on site; continuing to offer a community supported agriculture model, weekly veg boxes and volunteering opportunities to the community. The team hope to develop the space to enable more people to take part in skills training including schools and young people looking for work in the industry.

<u>Kirkstall Valley Farm – Jennifer Lawrence</u> https://kirkstallvalleyfarm.org.uk/

The farm have been developing their community supported agriculture model, weekly veg boxes and volunteering opportunities to the community. They believe they have a sustainable business model with tiered pricing to enable access to local produce for all. They are also looking at offering space to user groups wishing to grow but without an available location and have funding to deliver a series of Pick, Cook, Eat workshops to Leeds refugees.

Living Potential Care Farm - Tanya Bish https://www.livingpotentialcarefarming.org.uk/

Tanya confirmed that the farm are developing well, and hoping to establish a community supported agriculture model with veg boxes in the future. While they build up the veg box scheme they are supplying their produce to Leeds Veg Box Scheme for distribution.

Blue Marble Composting - Anne and Sol @leedsbluemarble

Anne confirmed that the group have been continuing to promote Bokashi composting to students and the local community using social media, zines and fundraising events. Last year they sourced funding for 30 kits to be distributed and hope to share more in the future. They are also exploring potential for composting facilities at student lets in the city and working with Rainbow Junktion to develop a hot bin system at their site.

<u>Swillington Farm – Jo Cartwright https://swillingtonorganicfarm.co.uk/</u>

Jo confirmed that the farm has been registered organic for 25 years now, the CSA for veg and eggs are hoping to expand to 80 subscriptions this year, a shared farmer is due to start on site soon and the school visits programme is doing well.

The nursery are continuing to engage with parents and provided compost caddies to families to collect food waste at home for composting in the nursery composting bays.

Alison updated on the progress of the Wellbeing Garden being developed at St James' Hospital – planning permission had been granted and work should be starting this year. The RHS are working with Season Well to engage local groups through the Food for Thought network, offering skills sharing sessions on growing and cooking and social opportunities.

Alison also confirmed that Halton in Bloom have been developing a Climate Action Community Garden at Grove Road Park

<u>Grow to School – Ama Chaney https://www.growtoschool.co.uk/</u> and <u>https://www.facebook.com/GROWtoschool/</u>

Ama confirmed that Grow to School is continuing to offer high quality Food Growing in School, Outdoor Learning and Teacher Training to around 80 primary and SEND schools.

<u>Community Learning Partnerships – Susan Docherty https://clpcharity.org.uk/</u>

Susan confirmed that although the partnership is no longer working in schools they are continuing to develop programmes for young people and communities in Leeds 8 and Harehills. The latest project has been to fund and develop a new garden at Nowell Mount Community Centre.

Season Well CIC - Becky Mears https://seasonwell.co.uk/

The team are continuing to offer cooking and growing workshops to a range of groups across Leeds, Bradford and North Yorkshire, inspiring them to cook locally produced seasonal fruit and veg. The Teaching Garden, donated by Full Circle Funerals is being used regularly by Season Well and is the site of their community composting project. As above still collaborating with the RHS on the Food for Thought Network in inner East Leeds and developing a similar project in South Leeds: Beeston/Hunslet/Holbeck. Beckhill Community Garden - Lynn Brown https://www.facebook.com/beckhill.community.garden/

Lynn gave an overview of the last 12 months. An initial Litter Free Leeds campaign led to a group of community volunteers with an interest in reclaiming and developing a community space on a fly tipping site. They decided that the space could become a community garden with free locally grown crops for the community to help themselves to. Lynn enabled the group to start this new garden development, and it has already achieved so much in bringing the community together. The garden is flourishing with raised beds, a little veg library and a dedicated group of volunteers learning together.

<u>Living Potential Farm – Kirsty and Tanya https://www.livingpotentialcarefarming.org.uk/</u>

The team confirmed that the garden and farm are developing well with lots of users and volunteers. They are supplying produce to Leeds Veg Boxes and through a regular market stall in Wetherby.

Foodwise Compost Collective - Annie Whitehead https://foodwiseleeds.org/project/ccl/

Annie updated us on the progress of using the Community Composting model, developed in Brighton, with groups in Leeds. There are now 9 community composting hubs, each with 2 champions (trained to monitor the sites and maintain compost production), each hub supports at least 40 households.

Passion4Plants - Sarah & Rob Moores https://passion4plants.co.uk/

Oakwood Market Garden have completed a successful 3 years developing their current site and have signed another 3-year lease. Although Rob has been unable to commit as much time as he had hoped Sarah continues to manage the site and produce plants and vegetables for sale at Oakwood Farmers market and through Leeds Veg Box scheme. They also take in raw veg waste and organic substrate from mushroom production to compost and use on the farm.

Loads of good news to share, the Community Garden has its official opening in March, the Drury Fields composting project is running very successfully thanks to the support of the compost collective and they are exploring an additional site in Horsforth.

Claire confirmed how great it was to see that Penny has been recognised by FL for everything she does to support the Horsforth Community and that without her energy many of the projects would not have been so successful. Claire confirmed she will continue to support development in the area and looks forward to seeing what will happen in 2025.

Friends of Horsforth Hall Park - Janet Galvin

Spoke about her work with the Community Garden and how the Friends of Group and gardening volunteers have supported each other, volunteering together to achieve more in the space. She then spoke about the plans to work with the council to renovate the Japanese Garden. The group are running Wellbeing sessions on a Saturday morning and gardening on a Thursday afternoon, they also

plan to offer work days to tackle some of the larger restoration tasks.

<u>Headingley Greengrocer – Jane https://www.theheadingleygreengrocer.co.uk/</u>

Supported by Headingley Development Trust this local small food businesses sells locally grown produce from MVUF and Kirkstall Farm. They operate plastic free and support a number of wider charities including Plate2 Plate (collect and compost food waste), donate fresh produce to the Foodbank at Woodhouse and Rainbow Junktion. Jane confirmed that to remain a viable resource in the community they needed more customers, without the support of the community they cannot exist and Jane urged everyone to buy local.
